ICC Rep: Chris Ochoa: 3/15/19 is the last date to submit ICC award nominations for the conference this

year. CBOAC conference starts on 4/28 and goes to 5/2/19 in Pismo Beach. All of the Building Safety Month information is on the ICC website now. The theme is No Code, No Confidence. New this year is a 6/30 deadline for the Emory Rogers Leadership and Building Safety fellowship; this is an annual benefit available for deserving code council members to attend a nationally recognized executive development program to develop leadership skills. The fellowship will afford up to \$20,000 to cover the full expense of the education program and travel to and from program. Applications are on the ICC website. National Institute of Building Sciences (NIBS), in 2005 the came out with a mitigation study showing that for every \$1 spent on pre natural disaster mitigation, \$4 would be saved on the back end. They have since in 2018 updated the study with the results being for every \$1 spent on pre natural disaster mitigation, now you save \$11 on post disaster

Some workshops will be held next week on the 13, 14, and 15 on the 2019 code cycle alternative calculation methods for Res and Non-res. The Association is still moving forward with combining all of the CA State chapters into one chapter and having local divisions within the single State Chapter in an effort to enable better representation and power at the State level. The South West Section meeting is coming up in Phoenix on August 25th to 29th. Mike Stone will be giving a Soars Bonding and Grounding class in association with the Napa/Solano Chapter in Fairfield on Wednesday, April 17th.

The class is being hosted by the Building and Fire Departments and is fee to attend. February 19th in partnership with H and S Associates to provide CEU's for Cannabis Production Training, Glenn spoke to some who attended the January class and got good feedback. The class will be giving again on February 19th at the North Coast Builders Exchange, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (the class is on the calendar, but no flyer). Cost is \$175. Cost analysis of 2018 ICC Code changes reports minimum cost impacts for multi-family buildings

Home Innovation Research Labs, an independent subsidiary of the National Association of Home

Builders, released a report on the cost analysis for multifamily buildings — Estimated Costs of the 2018

ICC Code Changes for Multifamily Buildings — which shows minimum cost impacts for typical

multifamily buildings ranging from \$2,500 for a small two-story multifamily project to \$25,000 for a

larger five-story project. The higher costs are primarily due to significant changes involving elevators and wind load design. The study examined a list of 26 code changes affecting multifamily construction that were approved for incorporation into the 2018 International Codes. The changes affect the International Building Code (IBC), the International Energy Conservation Code (IECC), the International Fire Code (IFC) and the International Mechanical Code (IMC). Code Council honored by National Institute of Building Sciences for role in national mitigation study
The National Institute of Building Sciences (NIBS) recently honored the International Code Council with
its Institute Honor Award during its Building Innovation 2019 conference in Washington, D.C. The Code
Council received the award along with other sponsors of the updated and expanded Natural Hazard
Mitigation Saves Study. The 2018 Natural Hazard Mitigation Saves: 2018 Interim Report highlights
significant savings that result from implementing mitigation strategies in terms of safety, and the
prevention of property loss and disruption of day-to-day life. It found that adopting the 2018
International Codes generates a national benefit of \$11 for every \$1 invested. The national mitigation
benefit-cost ratio associated with code adoption is \$6 to \$1 for floods, \$10 to \$1 for hurricanes and \$12
to \$1 for earthquakes, with benefits coming through avoided casualties, post-traumatic stress, property
damage, business interruptions and insurance premiums. These findings demonstrate the importance of
regularly updated codes and consistent enforcement in order to mitigate damage from natural disasters.

Code Council CEO Dominic Sims named to National Institute of Building Sciences board of directors International Code Council Chief Executive Officer Dominic Sims, CBO, was recently named to the National Institute of Building Sciences (NIBS) board of directors. Since 2012, Sims has been responsible for the overall activities and financial performance of the Code Council, including its five subsidiaries. Prior to his work with the association, Sims served as the CEO of the Southern Building Code Congress International (SBCCI). The Institute was established by the U.S. Congress in the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 to bring the public and private sector together to advance the built environment. NIBS provides an annual report to the U.S. President and Congress outlining important issues before the building industry. Sims will serve a three-year term.
